

When creating hyperlinks, know the difference between remote & local pages. Remote pages are other webpages on the internet. Local pages, or local site information, are files on your computer or personal website.

When creating a link to someone else's site always remember to include the `http://` at the beginning of the url address. Your .html code should look something like this:

```
<a href="https://www.w3schools.com/html/">HTML tutorial</a>
```

When creating links to your own personal pages, you do not need the `https://www...` All you need is the file name that you are linking to. Your .html code should look something like this:

```
<a href="bio.html"> BIOGRAPHY </a>
```

If you want someone else's webpage to open in a new tab, you would want to use `target="_blank"`

For example:

```
<a href="https://www.w3schools.com/html/" target="_blank">HTML tutorial</a>
```

If your hyperlinks say something like:

```
<a href="file:///Users/Desktop/StickFreeks%20WWW/fairy%20foxes.html">
```

This means you have some broken links.

- Links should not start with `file:///`
- Do not include the "Desktop" in your links.
- *Do not use capital letters when saving your folders and file names*
- *And, if you use spaces, the url will be changed to %20...*
